

40 Days Of Lent Christmas Southeast Christian Church

The weeks before the celebration of Resurrection Day are often called Lent. The word Lent is an old word that simply means "lengthen" or "spring" as the daylight times become longer. The Lenten season is meant to prepare Christians to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus by looking at the special things that happened just before Jesus went to the Cross. This is similar to the way we prepare ourselves for Christmas during the Advent season. Typically, the Lenten season starts with Ash Wednesday, which is a day that is supposed to be one that focuses our attention on the shortness and frailty of life. It finds its wording in the "ashes to ashes" context of Genesis 3:19, 18:27 and Ecclesiastes 3:20. Lenten season is spoken of as having 40 days of fasting, but in fact there are 47 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday. According to some church traditions, you were not required to fast on Sundays because it was the Lord's Day. Therefore, if you subtract the 7 Sundays from the 47 days of the Lenten season, it will be 40 days. Most Christian church traditions encourage people to follow some sort of fasting; rarely does anyone do a full-on fast for the 40 days, but most will abstain from some foods, like sweets and desserts. Or, they will abstain from social media, television, or entertainment. This sort of discipline of the flesh will help us focus on what is most important. Our Bible studies will be from the parables and teachings in the gospels, during the week between Palm Sunday and Resurrection Sunday. This is known as the Passion Week, because of the intense love Jesus has for us, which he demonstrated on the cross.

In the Christian church Disciples of Christ, a prominent part of the leadership of the local congregation consists of elders. These are lay people, for the most part. The first and major part of this book consists of studies prepared for the elders at First Christian Church in New Martinsville, West Virginia. There are also some other studies on the same model for other purposes and a few samples of materials I had earlier prepared to assist elders in their normal worship responsibilities. I have served as a minister in the Christian church Disciples of Christ from the time I finished seminary in the spring of 1976. I retired in October 2007 and have continued in a modest role since then. Out of my ministry came an impulse to come to terms with the rich spiritual and theological, pastoral, and personal ferment that I encountered. The bases of that search lay in my reading and study, in my prayer, and in my pastoral practice. My background includes a BA from the College of Wooster with a major in chemistry and an MS from Purdue University, working in the school of chemical engineering. I left Purdue as a PhD student, having completed everything except the dissertation, in January 2003. I received my DMin from Christian Theological Seminary in 1976 and was then ordained to Christian ministry by the Region of Indiana and First Christian Church in Lafayette, Indiana. Over the years, I found that my writing in a variety of formats served me well in growing my understanding and capacity as a pastor, sharing the writings as I went along with friends and colleagues and parishioners. These I am collecting in major part in the series I am calling Directions of a Pastoral Lifetime. I hope that the value I have found in them may be more broadly shared.
