Despite some positive advancement in the voluntary adoption of paid parental leave, many organizations over the past 25 years have instead decreased paid leave for employees in the United States, choosing instead to let unpaid leave under the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) serve in its place. This regression in practice is perhaps the greatest unintended consequence of FMLA and surely was not the intent of Congress. The Nordics have gone farther than other rich democratic countries in coupling a big welfare state with public services that promote high employment and modest product- and labor-market regulations. Today, the U.S. lags behind other countries in economic security, opportunity, and shared prosperity. If the U.S. were to expand its existing social programs and add some additional ones, many ordinary Americans would have better lives. Kenworthy argues that, despite formidable political obstacles, the U.S. is likely to move toward social democratic capitalism in coming decades. As a country gets richer, he explains, it becomes more willing to spend more in order to safeguard against risk and enhance fairness. With social democratic capitalism as his blueprint, he lays out a detailed policy agenda that could alleviate many of America's problems.*

Single or married taxpayers are not allowed to deduct more than \$10,000 of property taxes and state and local income or sales taxes. Some states are considering repealing their income taxes and replacing them with employer-side payroll taxes. Taxes imposed on a business (such as employer payroll taxes) are still deductible under federal law. A business can just write them off their corporate income tax (or individual tax, if the business is a pass-through entity). This would not only totally offset the new limit on deducting state income taxes - it would amount to a sizable tax cut for many middle-class families. Other kinds of income like capital gains, interest, and dividends aren't hit by payroll taxes. Some states will likely pair the payroll tax shift with a new tax on capital income (similar to how Tennessee and New Hampshire tax interest and dividend income). Some states will join them, perhaps adding capital gains. I predict California, New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and Hawaii will implement this in 2018, followed closely by Maryland and Massachusetts. Small Business Owners, Freelancers and Contract Workers (Gig Workers)The new law changes the way "pass-through" entities (which pass profits directly to their owners as personal income) are treated in the tax code. Now many will be able to deduct 20 percent of their revenue from their taxable income (20 percent off their taxable earnings). Alternative Minimum Tax Raises the amount of income that would be exempt from AMT. For singles the exemption level will increase to \$70,300, and \$109,400 for married couples. Home Mortgage Interest Deduction. If you take out a new mortgage you will only be allowed to deduct the interest on debt up to \$750,000. Child Care Credit - doubled the current child tax credit from \$1,000 to \$2,000 per child under age 17. No Miscellaneous Itemized Deductions. Moving Expenses - You will no longer be able to deduct moving expenses related to a job change. Alimony Payments will no longer be deductible expense for divorce after 2017. The party receiving the payments would no longer need to pay tax on the income received. Why buy a book you can download for free? We print this book so you don't have to. A steady drumbeat of bad news about the state of our nation has convinced Americans that our country has gone off the rails. But where, exactly, did we go wrong? Maxine Eichner argues that the problem is that market pressures are overwhelming American families today. Eichner links "free-market family policy," a system in which families must fend for themselves without help from the government, to unstable relationships, reduced lifespans, kids' declining academicachievement, and low levels of happiness, compared with other wealthy countries. What's called for, she argues, is market regulation and an economy structured around supporting families.

Early care and education for many children in the United States is in crisis. The period between birth and kindergarten is a critical time for child development, and socioeconomic disparities that begin early in children's lives contribute to starkly different long-term outcomes for adults. Yet, compared to other advanced economies, high-quality child care and preschool in the United States are scarce and prohibitively expensive for many middle-class and most disadvantaged families. To what extent can early-life interventions provide these children with the opportunities that their affluent peers enjoy and contribute to reduced social inequality in the long term? Cradle to Kindergarten offers a comprehensive, evidence-based strategy that diagnoses the obstacles to accessible early education and charts a path to opportunity for all children. The U.S. government invests less in children under the age of five than do most other developed nations.

Most working families must seek private childcare, which means that children from low-income households, who would benefit most from high-quality early education, are the least likely to attend them. Existing policies, such as pre-kindergarten in some states are only partial solutions. To address these deficiencies, the authors propose to overhaul the early care system, beginning with a federal paid parental leave policy that provides both mothers and fathers with time and financial support after the birth of a child. They also advocate increased public benefits, including an expansion of the child care tax credit, and a new child care assurance program that subsidizes the cost of early care for low- and moderate-income families. They also propose that universal, high-quality early education in the states should start by age three, and a reform of the Head Start program that would include more intensive services for families living in areas of concentrated poverty and experiencing multiple adversities from the earliest point in these most disadvantaged children's lives. They conclude with an implementation plan and contend that these reforms are attainable within a ten-year timeline. Reducing educational and economic inequalities requires that all children have robust opportunities to learn, fully develop their capacities, and have a fair shot at success. Cradle to Kindergarten presents a blueprint for fulfilling this promise by expanding access to educational and financial resources at a critical stage of child development.
