Taking a unique approach, which highlights lived experience and engagement with community, this book guides the reader on learning environments in which children are encouraged to develop relationships, build meaningful connections and take action that contributes to the wellbeing of their own communities. Through evaluations and feedback from participating professionals, as well as children's learning in the form of artworks and photos, *Building Empathy in Children through Community Connections: A Guide for Early Childhood Educators* highlights how community partnership programs between children and community groups builds empathy and connection in early childhood. Drawing on extensive research and professional experience in psychology and early childhood, it provides detailed information on community connections programs and considers the ways in which early learning settings can engage with their communities to meet the requirements and objectives of the curriculum. Each chapter provides practical advice on implementation as well as take-home messages intended to encourage and enable community engagement. Demonstrating how young children can develop empathy through community connections, this book is a vital resource for early childhood educators as well as parents and those working in community programs and early childhood settings.

More than half of the 25.9 million refugees in the world are under the age of 18 and the mental health of these children and adolescents constitutes a growing global public health priority. Refugee children and their families are at increased risk to develop mental health conditions but they often face major challenges in accessing adequate treatment and mental health professionals frequently feel ill-equipped to serve this group. Refugees are faced with a plethora of issues including the ambiguous loss of loved ones, psychological trauma related to their experiences of violence and atrocities, the complexities of daily life as a refugee, and the challenges to adapt to new systems and lack of support. Refugees' life circumstances all too often undermine their agency, as they face discrimination, stigma, and social isolation and exclusion. Refugees are frequently disconnected from the usual family and community supports that they once had, which contributes to mental distress. As parents struggle with these changes, their children often find it even more difficult to adapt and connect, which leads to increased prevalence of mental health conditions among refugees. Humanitarian policies recommend family-centered approaches that are multi-sectoral, multi-disciplinary, and focus on optimizing resource utilization. Over the last decade, a considerable body of research has emerged around socio-ecological models of mental health, family and community approaches, and resilience and strength-based approaches, but these insights are insufficiently incorporated in the practice of mental health care for refugee children. Clinicians often struggle with the common unique stressors that families face and are not familiar with working with families as units for intervention. Using

contextually informed assessment methods and family-oriented management approaches not only help individual children or also their families. This book aims to provide an overview of the latest theoretical insights from research on sociocultural aspects of health and connect these with clinical insights from practical mental health care provision. Using strengths-based, resiliency-based, family-centered approaches can enrich clinical practice in refugee mental health, but clinicians need to translate the emerging research into concrete steps and interventions. This requires additional skills for the assessment and management of mental health conditions in children and families. The chapters in this book are written by a diverse group of authors using global, multi-disciplinary approaches. The chapters provide examples from various contexts including refugees who are displaced to neighboring countries, refugees 'on the move', and refugees and asylum seekers in resettlement settings. This book is therefore a unique resource for clinicians, researchers and practitioners working on mental health issues of refugee children and adolescents around the world.

How we raise young children is one of today's most highly personalized and sharply politicized issues, in part because each of us can claim some level of "expertise." The debate has intensified as discoveries about our development-in the womb and in the first months and years-have reached the popular media. How can we use our burgeoning knowledge to assure the well-being of all young children, for their own sake as well as for the sake of our nation? Drawing from new findings, this book presents important conclusions about nature-versus-nurture, the impact of being born into a working family, the effect of politics on programs for children, the costs and benefits of intervention, and other issues. The committee issues a series of challenges to decision makers regarding the quality of child care, issues of racial and ethnic diversity, the integration of children's cognitive and emotional development, and more. Authoritative yet accessible, *From Neurons to Neighborhoods* presents the evidence about "brain wiring" and how kids learn to speak, think, and regulate their behavior. It examines the effect of the climate-family, child care, community-within which the child grows.

Over the past 15 to 20 years, different models of family-related services have evolved in different parts of the world. Much less documented is what drives the development of national policies and programmes in low- and middle-income countries and how the provision of family and parenting support impacts on child and adolescent well-being in these contexts. The publication aims to build the evidence base on what kind of family and parenting support works, under what conditions and for whom in order to promote child well-being in different national contexts. Case studies are included from: Belarus, Chile, China, Croatia, England, Jamaica, The Philippines, South Africa, and Sweden.

*Politics for the Love of Fandom* examines what Ashley Hinck calls "fan-based citizenship": civic action that blends with and arises from participation in fandom and commitment to a fan-object. Examining cases like Harry Potter fans fighting for fair trade, Y

fans donating money to charity, and football fans volunteering to mentor local youth, Hinck argues that fan-based citizenship created new civic practices wherein popular culture may play as large a role in generating social action as traditional political institutions such as the Democratic Party or the Catholic Church. In an increasingly digital world, individuals can easily move between many institutions and groups. They can choose from more people and organizations than ever to inspire their civic actions—e.g., fan-club membership for children's book series Harry Potter can become a foundation for involvement in political life and social activism. Hinck explores this new kind of engagement and its implications for politics and citizenships, through case studies that encompass fan-based action for sports, YouTube channels, movies, and even toys. She considers the ways in which fan-based social engagement arises or is fostered from fan communities seeking to change their world as a group, as well as the methods creators use to leverage their fans for social action. The modern shift to networked, fluid communities, Hinck argues, opens up opportunities for public participation that exist outside of political parties, houses of worship, and organizations for social action. Fan-based citizenship performances help us understand the future possibilities of public engagement, as fans and creators alike tie the ethical frameworks of fan-objects to a social goal, such as volunteering for political candidates, mentoring at-risk youth, and promoting environmentally friendly policies. *Politics for the Love of Fandom* examines the communication at the center of these civic actions, exploring how fans, nonprofit organizations, and media companies manage to connect internet-based fandom with public issues.

This open access book examines the implications of the COVID-19 Pandemic for education systems and argues that major education reforms will be necessary, particularly in the Global South, to address the learning loss caused by the pandemic. To inform those reforms, knowledge about the implementation reforms in the Global South is necessary, and such knowledge is seriously lacking as the existing literature on the implementation of educational change focused principally in reforms in countries in the Global North. This book contributes to address this gap by examining five major education reforms in India, Egypt, Taiwan, Vietnam, and Senegal, and by presenting two novel approaches to climate change education using a bottom-up strategy of reform. The chapters examine the implementation process drawing on a theoretical model of educational change by Reimers (published in *Educating Students to Improve the World* by Springer in 2020). The book concludes discussing the implementation of such reforms as an evolutionary and learning process.

Much of this has been spurred by efforts at understanding the exclusions confronted by certain populations, to develop the notion of and mechanisms by which communities can include those who are marginalised and/or oppressed, and in some contexts to 'bring back' community as something real or imagined. In spite of this, this deceptive term remains shrouded in epistemological darkness, conveniently endorsed but often little theorised and less understood. This text provides an exciting introductory textbook, drawing academics, policy makers and activists from various fields to theorise, create new and innovative conceptual platforms and develop further the hybrid idea of inclusive communities.

There is much to celebrate since the Convention was adopted in 1989, from declining infant mortality to rising school enrolment. But this milestone must serve as an urgent reminder of the millions of children not yet reached and an opportunity to find new ways of reaching them.*

*The Measuring Early Learning Quality and Outcomes (MELQO) initiative began in 2014 as part of the global emphasis on early childhood development (ECD). Led by UNESCO, the World Bank, the Center for Universal Education at the Brookings Institution and UNICEF, the initiative aims to promote feasible, accurate and useful measurement of children's development and learning at the start of primary school, and of the quality of their pre-primary learning environments. Items are designed for children between the ages of 4 and 6 years. Following the premise that many existing tools include similar items, the leading organizations's core team worked with a consortium of experts, non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and multilaterals to build upon current measurement tools to create a common set of items organized into modules for measuring: 1) early childhood development and learning, and 2) the quality of pre-primary learning environments. The MELQO core team and experts also collaborated to outline a process for context-specific adaptation of the measurement modules resulting from lessons learned from field-testing*

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*in several countries in 2015 and 2016. The modules are designed to be implemented at scale, with an emphasis on feasibility for low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). A key question addressed by MELQO was the balance between a global tool suitable for use everywhere, and local priorities and goals for children's development. [Introduction, ed]*

Part 1 presents a league table of child well-being and details performance in the areas of material well-being, healthy and safety, education, behaviours and risks, and housing and environment. Part 2 looks at subjective well-being, and features a league table of children's life satisfaction. Part 3 examines changes in child well-being in advanced economies over the*

first decade of the 2000s, looking at each country's progress in educational achievement, teenage birth rates, childhood obesity levels, the prevalence of bullying, and the use of tobacco, alcohol and drugs.
