The volume also includes an updated text of the author's earlier book *Hamlet Observed*, and an account of actors' experiences of performing at Elsinore.

Acclaimed as a modern dramatic masterpiece, *Rosencrantz & Guildenstern are Dead* is the fabulously inventive tale of Hamlet as told from the worm's-eye view of the bewildered Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, two minor characters in Shakespeare's play. In Tom Stoppard's best-known work, this Shakespearean Laurel and Hardy finally get a chance to take the lead role, but do so in a world where echoes of *Waiting for Godot* resound, where reality and illusion intermix, and where fate leads our two heroes to a tragic but inevitable end. Tom Stoppard was catapulted into the front ranks of modern playwrights overnight when *Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead* opened in London in 1967. Its subsequent run in New York brought it the same enthusiastic acclaim, and the play has since been performed numerous times in the major theatrical centers of the world. It has won top honors for play and playwright in a poll of London Theater critics, and in its printed form it was chosen one of the "Notable Books of 1967" by the American Library Association.

This is the first book to view Shakespeare's plays from the prospect of the premodern death arts, not only the *ars moriendi* tradition but also the plurality of cultural expressions of *memento mori*, funeral rituals, commemorative activities, and rhetorical techniques and strategies fundamental to the performance of the work of dying, death, and the dead. Engel and Rory Loughnane, he has co-authored *The Death Arts in Renaissance England* (2022) and, with Donald Beecher, edited *Henry Chettle's Kind-Heart's Dream and Piers Plainness: Two Pamphlets from the Elizabethan Book Trade* (2021). He has also co-authored *The Memory Arts in Renaissance England* (2016) with Engel and Loughnane and co-edited three collections: *Taking Exception to the Law* (2015), *Ars reminiscendi* (2009), and *Lethe's Legacies* (2004).

The four plays of Shakespeare's *Henriad* and the slightly later *Hamlet* brilliantly explore interconnections between political power and interior subjectivity as productions of the newly emerging constellation we call modernity.
