In the era of "big data," science is increasingly information driven, and the potential for computers to store, manage, and integrate massive amounts of data has

given rise to such new disciplinary fields as biomedical informatics. After defining an ontology as a representation of the types of entities in a given domain, the book distinguishes between different kinds of ontologies and taxonomies, and shows how applied ontology draws on more traditional ideas from metaphysics. It presents the core features of the Basic Formal Ontology (BFO), now used by over one hundred ontology projects around the world, and offers examples of domain ontologies that utilize BFO. The book also describes Web Ontology Language (OWL), a common framework for Semantic Web technologies. Throughout, the book provides concrete recommendations for the design and construction of domain ontologies.

He also shows how new research reveals what's happening in the brain when we're in a state of *wu-wei*—why it makes us happy and effective and trustworthy, and how it might have even made civilization possible.
