Spectrum Disorder is diagnosed under the category of developmental disabilities, and has increased in prevalence within the past few d

However, because most research has been directed towards early intervention strategies for children, adults with developmental disabilities are often overlooked, especially with regard to social/emotional support. Of these concerns, death and dying, as well as other types of loss, are often overlooked. This is not only because of a general tendency in Western culture to avoid the topic, but also because caregivers assume their persons will not understand, and are hesitant to upset them. Additionally, the experience of loss encompasses more than the death of a loved one (e.g., a loved one moving away, or getting a new job and leaving the company). These smaller losses affect an individual's life more frequently, and often go unacknowledged. In this case study, art therapy sessions were used to facilitate conversations about loss with an adult male who had experienced several losses throughout his lifetime. The eight sessions included two interview sessions to access logistical information and six art making sessions. Topics discussed included the individual's time spent at the organization, people he has interacted with, and the death of his grandparents. The results supported the idea that individuals with autism understand and can process the concept of loss, and want to be included in the conversation. However, there are challenges communicating their needs to caregivers and other people in their lives. In this study, art therapy served as documentation of the individual's experience discussing important life events, and also provided a starting point for future conversations with caregivers. Future research in this area is necessary and should strive to include more sessions, groups of individuals, and expand to non-verbal individuals with autism and other developmental disabilities.

She could tell her parents what her years had been like and reveal all the emotions and intelligence residing within her; she became their guide into the autistic experience. Valerie, with insights and stories and poetry from Emily, *I Have Been Buried Under Years of Dust* highlights key moments of Emily's childhood that led to her communication awakening—and how her ability rapidly accelerated after she wrote that first sentence. As Valerie tells her father's story, she shares the knowledge she's gained from working as a legal advocate for families affected by autism and other neurological disorders. A memoir of unconditional love, faith in the face of difficulty, and the grace of perseverance and acceptance, *I Have Been Buried Under Years of Dust* is an evocative and affecting mother-daughter memoir of learning to see each other for who they are.

She outlines theories of social and emotional development, the importance of mental health during pregnancy, how genetics and environment contribute to temperament, how to improve a toddler's speech through verbal interactions, the power of play and pretend, how to help children understand right versus wrong, and how to navigate interactions with adult children. Parenting can be a more positive experience if you can understand the developmental process, have good communication tools, and use effective strategies to manage stress while spending time with our families. Many others played starring roles too: doctors like Leo Kanner, who pioneered our understanding of autism; lawyers like Tom Gilhool, who took the families' battle for education to the courtroom; scientists who sparred over how to treat autism; and those with autism, like Temple Grandin, Alex Plank, and Ari Ne'eman, who explained their inner worlds and championed the philosophy of neurodiversity. This is also a story of fierce controversies—from the question of whether there is truly an autism “epidemic,” and whether vaccines played a part in it; to scandals involving “facilitated communication,” one of many treatments that have proved to be blind alleys; to stark disagreements about whether scientists should pursue a cure for autism. There are dark turns too: we learn about experimenters feeding LSD to children with autism, or shocking them with electricity to change their behavior; and the authors reveal compelling evidence that Hans Asperger, discoverer of the syndrome named after him, participated in the Nazi program that consigned disabled children to death. By turns intimate and panoramic, In a Different Key takes us on a journey from an era when families were shamed and children were condemned to institutions to one in which a cadre of people with autism push not simply for inclusion, but for a new understanding of autism: as difference rather than disability.*
