education. The

survey results did

not show that

students

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graduating from journalism school are perceived as highly skilled in the job functions of the profession.

Few responding television news directors rated graduates as extremely good or moderately good at the skills in question. Writing

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and copy-editing abilities were among the most poorly ranked and indicate areas deserving of more attention from journalism educators. The findings suggest, though, that a broadcast degree is worth it for journalism

students seeking a job in television as responses were less favorable for graduates without one. Even further, being more qualified or having converged journalism experience does not necessarily mean a higher salary or an
