Government agencies, like FEMA, and others have published documents that will guide a planning group through the process from beginning to end. The good news for my small city was several local governments could combine into a multi-jurisdictional organization for disaster preparedness planning. The City of Brighton could also do it. We could form a disaster preparedness organization on a regional basis. We would convince the Mayor to appoint a coordinator who would contact the surrounding four townships, requesting that they each appoint a representative to participate in the organization. The organization would identify and prioritize potential disasters and proceed to develop a comprehensive disaster preparedness plan. My small city, Brighton, Michigan (population 6,000) would have a disaster plan. When disaster strikes, school librarians can play a key role in keeping kids safe.
