Working in an emergency department as a psychiatrist or mental health clinician requires an ability to gain a patient’s rapport, establish a differential diagnosis, assess risk and make disposition decisions in a fast-paced and potentially chaotic setting. Patients may be medically ill, agitated, intoxicated, or suicidal, and resources for treatment may be difficult to access. A Case-Based Approach to Emergency Psychiatry provides the emergency department clinician with vivid and complex cases, discussed by psychiatrists who work daily in the emergency setting, that illustrate basic principles of assessment, diagnosis and treatment. These challenging and complex cases are based on the years of experience of the authors combined with current evidence-based practices and discussion. Risk assessment, psychosis, mood disorder, substance abuse, ethics, forensic issues, and personality disorders are discussed, along with child and adolescent, geriatric, and developmental disabilities. Special attention is also paid to alternatives to inpatient care, short-term crisis intervention, and the interface between medical and psychiatric illnesses. The case-based format allows the authors to link aspects of the clinical presentation to discussion and literature review in a memorable and compelling format.

This comprehensive book addresses the acute emergencies in neuromuscular disease from a novel perspective, focusing on clinical management and treatment of these disorders rather than the more traditional neuropathology, neurogenetics, and neurophysiology approaches. The book fills the gap in guidelines by providing an evidence-based guidance for the clinical adult or pediatric neurologist confronted by an acutely ill patient in a potentially life-threatening situation. The book is structured according to pathophysiologic principles, but each chapter is strictly organised around case vignettes that emphasize clinical relevance allowing the non-specialist to access complex scientific backgrounds. The electronic supplementary material and multimedia are provided as an integral tool to facilitate accessibility and understanding of a notoriously difficult field of neurology. Finally, the role of patients, who are increasingly involved in many management decisions, is highlighted in a chapter on ethical issues discussing withholding or withdrawing life-sustaining therapy, patient end-of-life values, wishes and preferences, and on advanced directives. The publication is aimed equally at the non-specialist neurologist in frontline clinical practice confronted by a rare disorder needing immediate management decisions, at the clinical specialist referring for guidance in specific management aspects, and at the specialist researcher keen to maintain clinic relevance.

Each chapter represents a disease state or symptom cluster and concisely summarizes the disease state, provides background, symptoms and signs, differential diagnoses, and immediate and long-term treatment options. Chapters named after a specific disease state or symptom cluster, arranged alphabetically for use in the field. The text begins with chapters covering patient evaluation: getting a good history, suicide risk assessment, physical exam, and when and how to use studies. Written by experts in psychiatry and emergency medicine, this text is the first to consider both medical perspectives in a concise guide. WERNICKE'S ENCEPHALOPATHY AND BIPOLAR DISORDER AT THE EMERGENCY UNIT: A CASE REPORTWernicke's encephalopathy is the presence of neurological symptoms caused by biochemical lesions of the central nervous system after exhaustion of B-vitamin reserves, in particular thiamine (vitamin B1). The prevalence is around 2%, and is considered underdiagnosed. Probably, many cases are in patients who do not have commonly-associated symptoms, as occur in patients with comorbid psychiatric diagnosis. We present a case of 57 years old man who arrived to the emergency unit because of behavior disorders. When we evaluated the patient, he had low level of consciousness. He presented myoclonus in all extremities and bilateral multidirectional nystagmus. The patient had a previous diagnosis of bipolar disorder and in recent months he had been living in a caravan in unhealthy conditions, with a diet based on water intake exclusively.Admission to the general hospital was carried out. After carrying out complementary tests, the patient had vitamin B1 deficiency as well as other vitamins such as folic acid. After resolving organic syndrome, a psychotic depression episode was diagnosed. Probably, this episode led to the state of isolation and malnutrition that the patient presented from the last weeks before arriving at the emergency unit.The coexistence of somatic and psychiatric diseases is not uncommon. As the case presented, when the symptoms are not completely clear and there are data of a certain organicity, it is important to work as a team with the rest of medical specialties ensuring an integral attention of our patients, always prioritizing the most serious pathology.

The authors define an “ emergency ” movement disorder as one in which failure to promptly diagnose and treat may result in significant morbidity or mortality. However, they also stress the importance of certain “ can ’ t miss ” diagnoses such as Wilson ’ s disease, dopa-responsive dystonia, and Whipple ’ s disease in which delayed diagnosis in less emergent situations can lead to slowly evolving and often irreversible neurological damage with tragic consequences.

Emergency physicians, in all practice settings, care for patients with both undifferentiated psycho-behavioral presentations and established psychiatric illness. This reference-based text goes beyond diagnostics, providing practical input from physicians experienced with adult emergency psychiatric patients. The chapters on suicidal and uncooperative patients dwell on particularly challenging clinical situations, emphasizing ethical issues and the need to ensure the safety of the patient. A discussion of the medicolegal aspects of a psychiatric emergency in developing countries is of relevance since many countries still follow outdated and archaic legal procedures. As patients often present to the emergency department both with psychiatric as well as physical symptoms, a few chapters are devoted to psychiatric emergencies associated with medical disorders, sexual disorders and drug-related issues. This book aims to meet the needs of physicians, researchers and all emergency care personnel dealing with those in a state of emotional crisis. It should serve to help all types of mental health professionals in developing countries to effectively and appropriately manage the various kinds of psychiatric emergencies.
