adventures in journalism

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during World War II. In the spring of 1944, Hemingway traveled to London and then to France to cover World War II for Colliers Magazine. Obviously he

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was a little late in arriving. Why did he go? He had resisted this kind of journalism for much of the early period of the war, but when he finally decided to go,

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he threw himself into the thick of events and so became a conduit to understanding some of the major events and characters of the war. He flew missions with

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the RAF (in part to gather material for a novel); he went on a landing craft on Omaha Beach on D-Day; he went on to involve himself in the French Resistance

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forces in France and famously rode into the still dangerous streets of liberated Paris. And he was at the German Siegfried line for the horrendous killing

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ground of the Huertgen Forest, in which his favored 22nd Regiment lost nearly man they sent into the fight.

After that tragedy, it came to be argued, he

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was never the same. This invigorating narrative is also, in a parallel fashion, an investigation into Hemingway's subsequent work—much of it stemming

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from his wartime experience—which shaped the latter stages of his career in dramatic fashion.

The Dangerous Summer is Hemingway's firsthand

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chronicle of a brutal season of bullfights. In this vivid account, Hemingway captures the exhausting pace and pressure of the season, the camaraderie and

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pride of the matadors,
and the mortal drama—as
in fight after fight—the
rival matadors try to

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questions (and questioners) he didn't like, and the high seriousness and dedication to his craft. The pieces from the early days are largely short snippets from newspapers; it is only later - from the 1940s on -

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that Hemingway begins to get the star treatment from publications such as the New Yorker or George Plimpton's Paris Review. Consequently the best comes last. A splendid, delicious book - for Hemingway

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fans, one well worth savoring.

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the challenges of training, and the nuances of fighting while female. She shares her own experiences, good and bad, as she takes on her first few amateur fights. With the literary acumen and panache of

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fighting's greatest writers, like A. J. Leibling, Joyce Carol Oates, and Katherine Dunn, but from the perspective of someone who has been in the ring, *Seconds Out* brilliantly explores our culture's relationship with

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violence, particularly when it is practiced by women.

There are some things which cannot be learned quickly, and time, which is all we have, must be paid heavily for their acquiring. They are the very

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simplest things, and because it takes a man's life to know them the little new that each man gets from life is very costly and the only heritage he has to leave. In the winter of 1933, Ernest Hemingway and his wife Pauline

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set out on a two-month safari in the big-game country of East Africa, camping out on the great Serengeti Plain at the foot of magnificent Mount Kilimanjaro. “I had quite a trip,” the author told his friend Philip Percival, with

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characteristic understatement. Green Hills of Africa is Hemingway's account of that expedition, of what it taught him about Africa and himself. Richly evocative of the region's natural beauty, tremendously alive to its

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character, culture, and customs, and pregnant with a hard-won wisdom gained from the extraordinary situations it describes, it is widely held to be one of the twentieth century's classic travelogues.
