In the collection's title story, a woman living with her daughter and her daughter's American husband fears the loss of Filipino tradition, especially Catholicism, as she tries to secretly permeate her granddaughter's existence with elements of her ancestry. In "New Relations," an American-born son introduces his mother to his Caucasian bride and her family, only to experience his first marital discord around issues of politesse, the perception of culture, and post-colonial legacies. Roley's delicately nuanced collection often leaves the audience with the awkwardness that comes from things lost in translation or entangled in generational divides.
