

Life Orientation Past Year Papers Grade 12

This book considers how the termination of life might be accepted in the view of a general obligation to protect life. It features more than 10 papers written by scholars from 14 countries that offer international comparative empirical research. Inside, readers will find case studies from such areas as: India, Chile, Germany, Italy, England, Palestine, Lithuania, Nigeria, and Poland. The papers focus on three limitations of the right to life: the death penalty, abortion, and euthanasia. The contributors explore how young people understand and evaluate the right to life and its limitations. The book presents unique empirical research among today's youth and reveals that, among other concepts, religiosity matters. It provides insight into the acceptance, perception, and legitimation of human rights by people from different religious and cultural backgrounds. This investigation rigorously tests for inter-individual differences regarding political and judicial rights on religious grounds, while controlling for other characteristics. It will help readers better understand the many facets of this fundamental, yet controversial, philosophical question. The volume will be of interest to students, researchers, as well as general readers searching for answers.

In the United States, some populations suffer from far greater disparities in health than others. Those disparities are caused not only by fundamental differences in health status across segments of the population, but also because of inequities in factors that impact health status, so-called determinants of health. Only part of an individual's health status depends on his or her behavior and choice; community-wide problems like poverty, unemployment, poor education, inadequate housing, poor public transportation, interpersonal violence, and decaying neighborhoods also contribute to health inequities, as well as the historic and ongoing interplay of structures, policies, and norms that shape lives. When these factors are not optimal in a community, it does not mean they are intractable: such inequities can be mitigated by social policies that can shape health in powerful ways. *Communities in Action: Pathways to Health Equity* seeks to delineate the causes of and the solutions to health inequities in the United States. This report focuses on what communities can do to promote health equity, what actions are needed by the many and varied stakeholders that are part of communities or support them, as well as the root causes and structural barriers that need to be overcome.

An attentive reader embarking on this book might wonder what "the" economic transition to which the title refers might be. In this

century almost all countries have gone through periods of economic transition; but which period of economic history can claim to embody the notion or to represent the era of "the" transition? Definitely, no country or group of countries has experienced anything comparable to the economic upheavals that the fall of communism has brought about in a large portion of the world in just three years (1989 to 1991). No other "transition" to date has prompted more interest and more studies among economists, academics and policy-makers than has the transformation of centrally planned economies into market-based systems. It is this transformation that has come to define "the" transition. Early in the transformation process (in November 1990), with the support of the Centre for Co-operation with the Economies in Transition (CCET), I launched a conference to examine the challenges faced by these countries. About six years have gone by and a new economic landscape has emerged in that part of the world. The difficulties in transforming these economies have exceeded all expectations, and economic performances have varied considerably across countries. The time has come, therefore, to make a first evaluation of progress and problems, with a view to extracting useful policy lessons to guide policy-makers in successfully completing the transition in the near future.

This book takes a fresh look at the relations between literature and biography by tracing the history of their connections through three hundred years of French literature. The starting point for this history is the eighteenth century when the term 'biography' first entered the French language and when the word 'literature' began to acquire its modern sense of writing marked by an aesthetic character.

Arguing that the idea of literature is inherently open to revision and contestation, Ann Jefferson examines the way in which biographically-orientated texts have been engaged in questioning and revising definitions of literature. At the same time, she tracks the evolving forms of biographical writing in French culture, and proposes a reappraisal of biography in terms not only of its forms, but also of its functions. Although Ann Jefferson's book has powerful theoretical implications for both biography and the literary, it is first and foremost a history, offering a comprehensive new account of the development of French literature through this dual focus on the question of literature and on the relations between literature and biography. It offers original readings of major authors and texts in the light of these concerns, beginning with Rousseau and ending with 'life-writing' contemporary authors such as Pierre Michon and Jacques Roubaud. Other authors discussed include Mme de Stael, Victor Hugo, Sainte-Beuve, Barbey d'Aurevilly, Baudelaire, Nerval, Mallarmé, Schwob, Proust, Gide, Leiris, Sartre, Genet, Barthes, and Roger Laporte.

What the Least Religious Nations Can Tell Us About Contentment

Before he began his recent travels, it seemed to Phil Zuckerman as if humans all over the globe were “getting religion”—praising deities, performing holy rites, and soberly defending the world from sin. But most residents of Denmark and Sweden, he found, don’t worship any god at all, don’t pray, and don’t give much credence to religious dogma of any kind. Instead of being bastions of sin and corruption, however, as the Christian Right has suggested a godless society would be, these countries are filled with residents who score at the very top of the “happiness index” and enjoy their healthy societies, which boast some of the lowest rates of violent crime in the world (along with some of the lowest levels of corruption), excellent educational systems, strong economies, well-supported arts, free health care, egalitarian social policies, outstanding bike paths, and great beer. Zuckerman formally interviewed nearly 150 Danes and Swedes of all ages and educational backgrounds over the course of fourteen months. He was particularly interested in the worldviews of people who live their lives without religious orientation. How do they think about and cope with death? Are they worried about an afterlife? What he found is that nearly all of his interviewees live their lives without much fear of the Grim Reaper or worries about the hereafter. This led him to wonder how and why it is that certain societies are non-religious in a world that seems to be marked by increasing religiosity. Drawing on prominent sociological theories and his own extensive research, Zuckerman ventures some interesting answers. This fascinating approach directly counters the claims of outspoken, conservative American Christians who argue that a society without God would be hell on earth. It is crucial, Zuckerman believes, for Americans to know that “society without God is not only possible, but it can be quite civil and pleasant.”

Sexual orientation health disparities are well-documented. However, sampling and measurement limitations frequently require researchers to collapse distinct sexual minority subgroups into a single "lesbian, gay, or bisexual" (LGB) analytic group, obscuring subgroup differences in health (e.g., between lesbians/gay men, bisexuals, and heterosexuals reporting same-sex attractions or behaviors ["heterosexual-identified sexual minorities, HSM"]). While a growing, but limited body of research has shown that different subgroups of sexual minorities vary on the basis of mental health status and substance use behaviors, little is known about the factors contributing to subgroup differences in health. This dissertation attempts to fill this gap in the literature using nationally-representative quantitative data. Heterosexuals reporting only opposite-sex attractions and behaviors ("heterosexuals") are compared to three sexual minority subgroups (lesbians/gay men, bisexuals, and HSM) in each of three studies. In a first study, group differences in mental health (SF-12) were assessed, and across a range of sociodemographic, lifestyle, and psychosocial characteristics. Next, the degrees to which sociodemographic, lifestyle, and psychosocial characteristics attenuated mental health disparities between heterosexuals and each sexual minority subgroup were assessed. A second study assessed sexual orientation group differences in mental health resilience, among those reporting two or more stressful life events in the past year. Path analysis assessed the degree to which social support mediated (i.e., accounted for) subgroup differences in "thriving" and "languishing" resilience status. In a third study, group differences in DSM-V alcohol, tobacco, and cannabis use disorders were assessed between sexual orientation subgroups. Path analyses assessed the degree to which stressful life events mediated substance use disparities between heterosexuals and sexual minority subgroups, as well as the degrees to which stressful life events and LGB discrimination events mediated differences in substance use among sexual minority subgroups. Together, findings from all three papers underscore the broad diversity that exists across subgroups of sexual minorities. Further, these papers highlight that while sexual minorities share common experiences of poor mental health and increased substance use, relative to heterosexual people, that important health and social

differences also exist within the sexual minority population. These papers contribute new knowledge to our understanding of sexual minority health disparities, and to the social determinants of mental health, resilience, and substance use. This book strives to "come to terms" with lesbian, gay, and bisexual life, and with the controversial scientific and socio-cultural theories and arguments on the origin and meaning of homosexuality and queer life in the U.S. The author disrupts conventional psychological perspectives on queer life and identity and animates the debate between essentialism and constructionism.
