It is never possible to return literally to times and events of the past. Even places revisited will not be the same as they were. But we can, at least to some extent, go back in our minds. In trying to capture some of the past and record for posterity my lifetime of adventures, I find that my memory has been stretched more than I thought possible. The mind is a funny thing, and time is slippery stuff, but someone has said that we remember more than we think we do; that years after the fact, one day things fall into place and we say, "Ah yes, I remember that well."

Consists of a ledger (1928-1970) containing a continuous record of meeting minutes; the organization's constitution; a fairly complete set of program booklets; Mother-Daughter Banquet booklets; and ten newspaper clippings. The bulk of the information is from the 1930s to the 1940s. Also contains three Ohio Farm Women's Club Federation constitutions and a fairly complete set of annual and/or biennial state rosters through 1974. The rosters list state federation officers, district and county officers, executive committee members, chapter names organized by county, and chapter officers. There are three annual program booklets (1933, 1935, and 1937) for the Fruit Ridge Horticulture Society which appears to have been formed in 1898 in Sandusky County, Ohio. This organization is unrelated to the Ohio Farm Women's Club Federation. The booklets provide names of officers and members, monthly meeting dates and locations, topics, meeting agendas, and names of meeting leaders.

The First Christian and Missionary Alliance Church of Durham collection includes three folders and one scrapbook. The folders include the church bulletin from the 1989 centennial services and from a 1967 fiftieth anniversary service, a 1995 mother-daughter banquet program, two audiotapes of the 1989 homecoming, several letters and clippings related to individual church members, and numerous photographs, most unlabeled. The scrapbook contains the history of the church from

1926, including clippings and photographs of pastors and their families, many photographs of church members and church activities, several church-printed bulletins and other documents, organized by decade.

Woburn High School has instilled the importance of education in generations of students for over 160 years. The school opened its doors in 1852 with thirty-four students in a leased room at the Knight Building on Main Street. Increasing enrollment and curriculum requirements necessitated the building of a larger school on Main Street in 1854 and again in 1906 at the Dow Farm property on Montvale Avenue. Woburn's reputation as a leading leather manufacturer during the Civil War inspired the Tanner nickname, bull mascot and school motto: "Tanner Pride." With the leadership of thirteen principals throughout its history, over thirty-two thousand students have graduated from this school. Today, more than half the faculty are returning alumni, and generations of Woburn families continue to send their children to this school. Join author Susan Thifault as she explores a history of pride and tradition at Woburn High School.
