Part V offers advice about communication strategies beyond the page, which include giving talks, building a professional network, and participating in online communities. This book also provides 22 portfolio prompts that extend the guidance and examples in the earlier parts of the book and help writers build their portfolio of data communication.

This guide offers practical tips on science writing - from investigative reporting to pitching ideas to magazine editors. Some of the best known science writers in the US share their hard earned knowledge on how they do their job.
