Routine takes over for the grieving family: the siblings care for each other as they befriend a neighboring family and explore the woods; distance grows between the parents as they deal with their loss separately. But things spiral when the father, increasingly guilt ridden after Ruby's death, is sued for not properly installing a septic tank, which results in grave harm to a little boy. In the ensuing chaos, what really happened to Ruby finally emerges. With flowing prose that evokes the terrifying beauty of the Alaskan wilderness, Lin explores the fallout after the loss of a child and the way in which a family is forced to grieve in a place that doesn't yet feel like home. Phillis was tutored in reading and writing by Mary, the Wheatleys' 18-year-old daughter, and was reading

Latin and Greek classics from the age of twelve. Encouraged by the progressive Wheatleys who recognised her incredible literary talent, she wrote "To the University of Cambridge" when she was 14 and by 20 had found patronage in the form of Selina Hastings, Countess of Huntingdon. Her works garnered acclaim in both England and the colonies and she became the first African American to make a living as a poet. William Faulkner was a master of the short story. We don't live in places where we can hear those stories anymore; parents don't sit around and tell their children those classical, mythological, archetypal stories that we heard years ago. But new information has got to get out, and there are several ways to do it. One is the novel. With this statement Toni Morrison clearly suggests the function of her novel *Song of Solomon*. That is, on the one hand, the preservation of traditional Afro-American folktales and on the other hand their adaptation to contemporary times. Realizing this double function, it is very challenging to make the analysis of the mythological character of the novel the topic of a seminar paper. *Song of Solomon* is spiritually grounded in the folktale "People who could fly", an Afro-American folktale, which depicts the

escape of a community of slaves by taking flight. Therefore I will center my analysis on the motif of “ flight ” in the novel, presenting different ways of interpretation. First of all, I will point out the function of myth in Song of Solomon. In the third chapter I will concentrate on the folktale “ People who could fly ” , comparing it with Toni Morrison ’ s narration about Solomon. Being the focal point of this seminar paper, the discussion of the motif of “ flight ” follows in the fourth part. It deals with the connection between the motif of “ flight ” , which turns up time and again in Milkman ’ s life, and Milkman ’ s search for his identity. Moreover I will point out Pilate ’ s role in Milkman ’ s quest for his cultural heritage. The last chapter contains a discussion of the different modes of “ flight ” and their significance.
