By the spring of 1943, after the defeat at Stalingrad, the writing was on the wall. But while commanders close to the troops on Germany's various fronts were beginning to read it, those at the top were resolutely looking the other way. This seventh volume in the magisterial 10-volume series from the Militargeschichtliches Forschungsamt [Research Institute for Military History] shows both Germany and her Japanese ally on the defensive, from 1943 into early 1945. It looks in depth at the strategic air war over the Reich and the mounting toll taken in the Battles of the Ruhr, Hamburg, and Berlin, and at the "Battle of the Radar Sets" so central to them all. The collapse of the Luftwaffe in its retaliatory role led to hopes being pinned on the revolutionary V-weapons, whose dramatic but ultimately fruitless achievements are chronicled. The Luftwaffe's weakness in defence is seen during the Normandy invasion, Operation Overlord, an account of the planning, preparation and execution of which form the central part of this volume together with the landings in the south of France, the setback suffered at Arnhem, and the German counter-offensive in the Ardennes. The final part follows the fortunes of Germany's ally fighting in the Pacific, Burma, Thailand, and China, with American forces capturing islands ever closer to Japan's homeland, and culminates in her capitulation and the creation of a new postwar order in the Far East. The struggle between internal factions in the Japanese high command and imperial court is studied in detail, and highlights an interesting contrast with the intolerance of all dissent that typified the Nazi power structure. Based on meticulous research by MGFA's team of historians at Potsdam, this analysis of events is illustrated by a wealth of tables and maps covering aspects ranging from Germany's radar defence system and the targets of RAF Bomber Command and the US 8th Air Force, through the break-out from the Normandy beachhead, to the battles for Iwo Jima and Okinawa. Once, there was a world where the heroes were defined by their white clothing and the bad guys always wore black. The town sheriff always gunned down the wild gunslinger while the lady in distress cowered. The Indian was to be feared, not understood, and the white man always saved the day. This was the traditional Western. But times change, as did the Western. The evolving Western is told from the point of view of blacks, Native Americans, Hispanics, Asians, Jews, Gentiles, Mormons, Catholics, women, and men. It is about America; it is about life. Whether a story's central element is a hangman or a midwife, a piano or a cowboy who hates tomatoes, you may be certain of one thing, if the tale reflects an expanding continent, it reflects the American West.

*Fourth-wave-feminism has crept up on us and seems intent on destroying the Western world as we know it. That's the premise of this volume and Dr B Real explains what's happening, the reasons for this fourth wave of feminism, its proponents and the danger they are to the free world. This is the second volume of *Surviving Fourth Wave Feminism: The War on the West* and it digs down into detail with excruciating examples of how so-called feminists (both men and women) are aiming to drag Western society down to a lower level. The author explains why positive discrimination can't work and how it can be positively dangerous with examples from the armed services and even closer to home, police action or inaction in situations of extreme peril that require the very best of the police and which suffer from a lack of leadership or the proper training for such circumstances. Dr B gives the example of a fourth-wave-feminist in action in sports, where a champion is defeated but tries to deflect her public loss by claiming that she is a mother and she will not stand for what was (supposedly) done to her in the public arena. The winner is side-lined as the "champion" rants and raves and pouts. And yet, if you watch the match between the two players you can see that the champion just lost because her game wasn't good enough that day. What about women who are more interested in men for what they can do for them? The book describes the sort of women who would rather laze the day away without doing any work and expect men to pick up the slack to provide for them. Dr B identifies them as gold diggers*

and gives an awful example of a video showing a couple who have been together for five years breaking up because the girl would rather go with someone who is very obviously richer than her partner. And apparently, there are a large number of these videos on the Internet, which is saddening. Coming back to home turf, Australia, Dr B gives examples of a female media celebrity who is asked to participate in high-level meetings where they have no background and have no training for. And yet what they say is held with the highest regard. They also desecrate the memory of veterans when posting inappropriate messages on ANZAC day without thought as to how it might affect those who are remembering wounded or dead comrades or relatives. There are other equally repellent examples that demonstrate how women have been subverted from looking for equality of opportunity with men to wanting to get the same as men but by doing less and taking more. Worse is that younger girls are being indoctrinated into the same awful belief that men, particularly white men are the lowest of the low. Early on in the book Dr B introduces the concept of MGTOW, which is all about enlightened men deciding to go do their own thing rather than get involved with the possibility of being marginalise now or in the future by a woman who is hiding or yet to adopt her fourth-wave-feminism so that she can entrap him. It's clear that fourth-wave-feminism just cannot be ignored. Fortunately, Dr B has ideas for reducing or eliminating the impact of fourth-wave-feminism and devotes several pages to tips that will reduce its impact. Ultimately, if you're a man you're unlikely to be smiling by the time you've finished reading this but you'll be fully aware of the arguments and evidence that Dr B lays out for you. If you're a woman who's a little uncomfortable with the direction feminism seems to have taken this will be a chilling read.

The western American landscape has always had great significance in American thinking, requiring an unlikely union between frontier mythology and the reality of a fragile western environment. Additionally it has borne the burden of being a gendered space, seen by some as the traditional "virgin land" of the explorers and pioneers, subject to masculine desires, and by others as a masculine space in which the feminine is neither desired nor appreciated. Both Wallace Stegner and Cormac McCarthy focus on this landscape and environment; its spiritual, narrative, symbolic, imaginative, and ideological force is central to their

work. In this study, McGilchrist shows how their various treatments of these issues relate to the social climates (pre- and post-Vietnam era) in which they were written, and how despite historical discontinuities, both Stegner and McCarthy reveal a similar unease about the effects of the myth of the frontier on American thought and life. The gendering of the landscape is revealed as indicative of the attempts to deny the failure of the myth, and to force the often numinous western landscape into parameters which will never contain it. Stegner's pre-Vietnam sensibility allows the natural world to emerge tentatively triumphant from the ruins of frontier mythology, whereas McCarthy's conclusions suggest a darker future for the West in particular and America in general. However, McGilchrist suggests that the conclusion of McCarthy's Border Trilogy, upon which her arguments regarding McCarthy are largely based, offers a gleam of hope in its final conclusion of acceptance of the feminine.
