box of crayons to**

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**milk the family
cow—her seventy-
year love affair
with the arts was
born. Over the
years, she would
express her
creativity in many
forms, resulting in
thousands of
paintings,
sculptures, songs,
poems, and**

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**newspaper
columns and along
the way a variety
of artful cakes, as
she ran a
celebrated twenty-
five-year cake
business. Her art
appeared in all
shapes, sizes,
materials, and
“eatability.” For
most of her early**

**career, Gertrude
dabbled with a
variety of
styles—with
subjects mostly
centered around
life in rural
Mississippi and
her spiritual life.
But in 1980 at the
age of fifty-seven,
she attended her
first Mississippi**

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**Art Colony at
Camp Jacob in
Utica, Mississippi.**

**Over the next
fifteen years, she
would make her
pilgrimage twice a
year to be inspired
by celebrated
guest instructors
from around the
nation and
connect with**

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Kids**

**fellow artists. The
Colony was a
major catalyst,
exposing her to
new styles, giving
her
encouragement
and freedom to
experiment.
Gertrude said of
the Colony, “I
never knew
anything about**

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abstract art, but it fascinated me to no end. Abstract art to me is like a beautiful melody without words. In mixed media, I am in another world and often am surprised at the piece that evolves from the torn watercolor papers.

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**The effect is a
kaleidoscope of

the retinas dance.”**
