

United States Dual Citizenship Guide

What do governments do when much of their population simply gets up and walks away? In Mexico and other migrant-sending countries, mass emigration prompts governments to negotiate a new social contract with their citizens abroad. After decades of failed efforts to control outflow, the Mexican state now emphasizes voluntary ties, dual nationality, and rights over obligations. In this groundbreaking book, David Fitzgerald examines a region of Mexico whose citizens have been migrating to the United States for more than a century. He finds that emigrant citizenship does not signal the decline of the nation-state but does lead to a new form of citizenship, and that bureaucratic efforts to manage emigration and its effects are based on the membership model of the Catholic Church.

Citizenship policies are changing rapidly in the face of global migration trends and the inevitable ethnic and racial diversity that follows. The debates are fierce. What should the requirements of citizenship be? How can multi-ethnic states forge a collective identity around a common set of values, beliefs and practices? What are appropriate criteria for admission and rights and duties of citizens? This book includes nine case studies that investigate immigration and citizenship in Australia, the Baltic States, Canada, the European Union, Israel, Mexico, Russia, South Africa and the United States. This complete collection of essays scrutinizes the concrete rules and policies by which states administer citizenship, and highlights similarities and differences in their policies. From Migrants to Citizens, the only comprehensive guide to citizenship policies in these liberal-democratic and emerging states, will be an invaluable reference for scholars in law, political science, and citizenship theory. A notary is a public official responsible for independently verifying signatures and oaths. Depending on how a document is written, a notarization serves to affirm the identity of a signer and the fact that they personally executed their signature. A notarization, or notarial act, officially documents the identity of a party to a document or transaction and the occasion of the signing that others can rely upon, usually at face value. A notary's authentication is intended to be reliable, to avoid the inconvenience of having to locate a signer to have them personally verify their signature, as well as to document the execution of a document perhaps long after the lifetime of the signer and the notary. An oath is a sworn statement. In most cases a person will swear that a written statement, oral statement, or testimony they are about to give is true. A notary can document that the notary administered an oath to an individual.

"Learn About the United States" is intended to help permanent residents gain a deeper understanding of U.S. history and government as they prepare to become citizens. The product presents 96 short lessons, based on the sample questions from which the civics portion of the naturalization test is drawn. The Department of Licensing has worked to keep the notary public application process as simple as possible. A prospective notary need only submit a complete application, proof of a \$10,000 surety bond, and appropriate fees to the Department of Licensing in order to begin the process. Once an applicant has completed all application requirements and proven that he or she is eligible, the Department will have a new certificate of commission mailed out promptly. New in 2018, notaries public can also apply for an electronic records notary public endorsement, which allows the notary to perform notarial acts on electronic documents as well as paper documents. The application process is similar to the application process for the commission, and can be done at the same time or separately.

Considered the happiest country in the world, Denmark is a beautiful land where the people enjoy humble comforts and living simply. Referred to as hygge ("Hoog-uh"), is the Danish idea that happiness comes from the little things. It loosely translates into "coziness," which is what the Danes value most - a comfortable, happy life. Denmark, which dates back to the Viking age, is a kingdom located in northern Europe. It's part of Scandinavia along with Sweden and Norway. Denmark's form of state is a monarchy, with Queen Margrethe II presiding. The country consists of 406 islands and the peninsula of Jutland. It borders Germany. Denmark's largest island is Zealand. The total population of the country is more than 5,700,000 (2016). The capital of Denmark is Copenhagen, which has a population of more than 1,280,000 (2016). Citizenship in Denmark is not a birthright: it's based on descent. One or both parents must be citizens of the country. For naturalization, the residency requirement is seven years. Dual citizenship is recognized. Life goes by at a slower pace in Denmark. People focus on enjoying themselves. They work less than in other countries, live and think modestly, and have an excellent welfare system that takes care of everyone. Danes value their social lives over luxury. Copenhagen has been called "the World's Most Livable City." It's the country's capital and has the largest population of any city in the country. It also offers many attractions. June, July, and August are the most popular months for visiting when the days are longer and warmer (averaging 63°F or 17°C in January). If you enjoy winter and don't mind the darker days, December is also a favorite time to visit. The city has excellent public transportation, including the S-train, buses, and metro. Taxis and Uber are available, too. During the warmer months, the recommended way to travel around is by bicycle. Foodies will enjoy the city for its fine dining restaurants (the world-famous Michelin-starred Noma is located here) and bistros. Copenhagen also is known for its jazz clubs.

The rise of dual citizenship could hardly have been imaginable to a time traveler from a hundred or even fifty years ago. Dual nationality was once considered an offense to nature, an abomination on the order of bigamy. It was the stuff of titanic battles between the United States and European sovereigns. The state was once a jealous institution, justifiably demanding an exclusive relationship with its members. Today, the state lacks both the capacity and the incentive to suppress the status as citizenship becomes more like other forms of membership. Dual citizenship allows many to formalize sentimental attachments. For others, it's a new way to game the international system. This book explains why dual citizenship was once so reviled, why it is a fact of life after globalization, and why it should be embraced today.

Citizenship is an important issue, and becoming a more informed and active citizen is part of growing up. This guide examines what it means to be a citizen in the United States. It explains the ways people become citizens, the responsibilities of a citizen, and the rights of U.S. citizens.
